**SUMMARY:**

An intact body with a large amount of soft tissue still present on the trunk, upper arms and legs, including much of the skin. There was no adipocere formation.

The person was male, and as established from anthropology data was aged between 35 and 60, and measured from 160 to 176 cms in height. At the time of his death he had a short dark brown beard, but there were no other particular identifying features.

When found, he was still fully clothed and his hands were tied behind his back by a cloth ligature.

There was evidence of an apparent gunshot injury to the right side of the chest, with disruption of the upper part of the ribcage at the front and a metal bullet fragment within soft tissues at the back. Such an injury was certainly potentially fatal.

The only other injuries present were fractured ribs on both sides but these were probably the result of post mortem crushing of the body.

**CAUSE OF DEATH:**

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **KK3 166B** was:  
**Gunshot wound of chest**

This formal report is based upon the autopsy report that I prepared at the time of my examination. Both reports truly and accurately reflect my findings.
