## **SUMMARY:**

A complete body, with soft tissues still present on the trunk and thighs including dried leathery skin, but with partial skeletonization elsewhere, particularly the head and forearms.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male, aged between 31 and 71, and measured from 166 to 181 cms in height. He had dark brown hair and dentures in both jaws, but no other particular identifying features.

He died from a gunshot injury to the chest, the bullet probably entering at the back on the left side, fracturing three ribs and the shoulder blade, and passing through the lung. After that however, it was not possible to determine to track, no clear exit being identified and no bullet or bullet fragments remaining inside. The nature of the damage found <u>was</u> however, suggestive of a bullet injury.

There was also evidence of a gunshot injury to his left hand, where three bones were fragmented. This may or may not have been the same shot that went through the chest - when found, his hands were tied behind his back by a cloth ligature around the wrists.

The only other injuries were additional fractured ribs on both sides of the chest, and fractures of the pelvis, but those were likely to have been post mortem, caused by crushing or moving the body after death.

## CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **KK3 183B** was: **Gunshot injury to chest**
