## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

## SUMMARY:

Most of the upper half of a body including the head and the arms, completely skeletonized apart from a little brain tissue still present. There were however additional pieces of skull from another person mixed in and it was thus difficult to be certain which skull belonged to the rest of the body.

From anthropology examination the remains appeared to be from adult persons, with one of the skulls clearly being male. One of the persons had a pair of dentures.

Assuming that the main skull represented was the one which belonged to the trunk which was present, he probably died from a gunshot injury to the head, with a possible entrance hole in the top of the skull towards the back of the left side, extensive fracturing of the remainder, and tiny bullet fragments mixed in.

Elsewhere, there were multiple rib fractures on both sides of the chest and fractures of both shoulder blades, but these probably all occurred after death from crushing or moving of the body.

There were no other significant findings.

## CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 186BP was: Gunshot wound of head
