SUMMARY:

A more or less complete body minus just a few small bones from the hands, 2 ribs and a few vertebrae. The remains were partly skeletonized particularly in the upper half of the body, but with soft tissue still present elsewhere and a few internal organs surviving. From anthropological data, the person was male, aged between 31 and 58, and measured from 165 to 180 cms in height. There were no particular identifying features other than the fact that he had a salbutamol inhaler in his pocket suggesting that he had suffered from asthma.

He died from a gunshot wound to the head, the bullet entering at the back just to the left of the midline, and exiting probably through the right side of the face. Much of the skull was fragmented, as were the facial bones. No bullet fragments remained.

The only other injuries were fractured ribs on both sides of the chest, but these were almost certainly caused after death by crushing or moving of the body.

When found, he was still fully clothed.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 316B was:

Gunshot injury to head
