## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

## **SUMMARY:**

A complete body minus just two vertebrae at the top of the spine. The remains were totally skeletonized apart from a little dried tissue attached to some bones and the brain still present inside the skull.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male, aged between 31 and 71, and measured from 162 to 177 cms in height. There were no particular identifying features.

There was evidence of a probable gunshot injury to his neck, fracturing the back of six vertebrae in the spine and the inner end of the left collarbone, albeit no metal fragments were found in the region. There were additional fractures of the outer part of the collarbone and of the top of the adjacent scapula, which may or may not have been related. They did not appear to be from a separate shot. Apart from fractured ribs, almost certainly the result of post mortem crushing or moving of the body, there were no other injuries

The injury to the neck was certainly a potentially fatal one and likely to have been the cause of his death

When found, he was still fully clothed

## **CAUSE OF DEATH:**

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 369B was:

**Gunshot injury to neck**
