AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A complete body, with much of the skin and soft tissues still present, the former showing mummification, but with skeletonization of the skull and forearms.

The person was male and measured approximately 168cms in height. From anthropology data he was aged between 31 and 71. He had dark brown hair but there were no other particular identifying features.

He died from a gunshot wound to the chest, the bullet probably entering from the back where it had passed through the spine, and exiting at the front on the right side. No bullet fragments were found. There was an intact bullet in his right ankle, embedded in the skin, but this had not caused any underlying injuries and so had probably passed though an intermediate target before striking him.

The only other injuries were fractures of the lower jaw and of several ribs on both sides of the chest, almost certainly the result of post mortem crushing or moving of the body.

When found, there was clothing on the lower half of his body but not the upper half. His trousers were rolled up and his socks inside his pocket.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 460B was:

Gunshot injury to chest

This formal report is based upon the autopsy report that I prepared at the time of my examination. Both reports truly and accurately reflect my findings.
