AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

MORTUARY: Visoko

SUMMARY:

A complete body, partly skeletonized and with some bones disarticulated but with soft tissue still present in other areas.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male, aged between 30 and 60, and measured from 171 to 186 cms in height. There were old fractures of his right shin bones (tibia and fibula), suggesting that at some time in the past he had been injured in a road accident or something similar.

He died from gunshot wounds to his face and trunk, the first disrupting the middle of his lower jaw and possibly damaging the spine, and the second passing through his right shoulder joint and probably entering the chest. There was a third apparent shot to his right upper arm above the elbow.

The only other injuries were fractures of the pelvis on both sides, almost certainly from crushing of the body post mortem.

At the time of his death he had clothing on the lower part of his body, and his arms were tied behind his back by a ligature around the wrists.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 211B was:

Gunshot wounds of face and trunk

This formal report is based upon the autopsy report that I prepared at the time of my examination. Both reports truly and accurately reflect my findings.
