AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A complete and largely intact body, with the skin and soft tissues remaining over most of it, apart from the forearms and feet which were partly skeletonized.

The person was male, and as established form anthropology data was aged between 31 and 60, and measured from 166 to 181 cms in height. He would appear to have lost all his teeth, and at the time of his death had a short beard, but otherwise there were no particular identifying features.

He had been shot in the left hip, the bullet fragmenting the upper end of the femur and possibly also the sacrum, but no other obvious gunshot injuries were seen.

Elsewhere, there was evidence of gross post mortem crushing of the whole body from side to side, producing extensive fractures of the skull, ribs and pelvis. A fracture of the left upper arm at the shoulder may or may not have been similarly caused.

The gunshot injury to the hip was potentially fatal if he was left untreated and given no assistance, and so was a minimal cause of death, albeit that something else may have intervened before he succumbed.

The only other finding was that, when found there was a cloth ligature still around his left wrist.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 531B was:

Gunshot wound of hip
