## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

## SUMMARY:

A complete body, missing only some small bones from the hands. There was dried leathery skin on the trunk and legs with underlying soft tissue and internal organs, but with partial skeletonization elsewhere.

The person was male and measured approximately 164 cms in height. As estimated from anthropology data, he was aged between 31 and 71. The only additional identifying features were a metal bridge across four of his upper front teeth, and possible documents in his pocket.

There were fractures of his face and lower jaw which appeared to have been caused after death from crushing of the body. There was also fragmentation of the inner end of the right collarbone and of the right 4<sup>th</sup> rib near the spine., which could possibly have been caused by bullets, but as there were no clear defects in the skin around or bullet fragments remaining, it would be difficult to prove this.

There were no other injuries and so from this examination, the cause of death in this person must remain unascertained.

When found, there was a cloth ligature around his wrists.

## CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 538B was:

Unascertained
