AUTOPSY REPORT

SUMMARY:

A complete body, with dried skin and soft tissue present over much of it, but also with areas of skeletonization.

The person was male, and as established from anthropology data, was aged between 31 and 71, and measured from 173 to 188 cms in height. The only additional feature was evidence of disease of the spine where three of the chest vertebrae were fused together.

No obvious gunshot injuries were seen, but there were fractures of both bones of the right forearm, of one of the bones of the left hand, and of the lower end of the right femur. It was difficult to say whether these occurred before or after death, but if the former, they were indicative of blunt force trauma of some sort which could include blows from a heavy weapon, or stamping.

There were also fractures of the lower jaw, of a few ribs on either side of the chest, the left shoulder blade and one of the right shin bones, but most likely these were post mortem in nature from crushing or moving the body after death.

None of the injuries found would have been necessarily fatal, and although there may well have been internal damage associated with some of them, this cannot be proved, and so the cause of death in this person, from this examination, remains unascertained.
