AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

CASE NO: KK3 653B

SUMMARY:

A complete body, with no parts missing but with an additional portion of breastbone from another person mixed in. The remains were partly skeletonized, but with some dried skin remaining on the left side of the trunk and in the legs and some of the internal organs still also present.

The person was male, and as established from anthropology data was aged between 31 and 84 and measured from 166 to 182 cms in height. Possible additional identifying features were a gold tooth in his upper jaw and an old fracture of his right upper arm, with considerable residual deformity.

He died from a gunshot injury to his head, the bullet entering at the back on the right side and exiting at the front, with extensive fragmentation of the skull between. There was also a small defect in the lower jaw which may well have been a separate exit from one of the bullet fragments. Several small fragments were still present inside the skull.

He also appeared to have been shot through the right upper arm, just below the shoulder.

Other injuries included fractures of several ribs on both sides of the chest, of the right side of the pelvis, and of one of the right shin bones. All these were probably post mortem in nature, however, from crushing or moving the body after death.

When found, his hands were tied together behind his back by a cloth ligature.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 653B was:

Gunshot injury to head
