AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

Partly skeletonized human remains with mummified and liquefied soft tissues. Mummification is best seen in both limbs and the anterior wall of the trunk. The internal organs found in the body cavity did not show any evidence of injury.

Sex was determined as male, stature as 179.5 +/- 7.7 cm and age as 31 to 71 years, from anthropological data.

There were two bullet injuries found, both in upper arms. One in left upper arm with a fracture of humerus and the other in right elbow. There were bullet artefacts recovered from both of these injuries.

The grossly fragmented skull did not show significant evidence of firearm injury. The findings are not sufficient to conclude whether the skull fractures are ante or post mortem. No injuries found in the rest of the body. Considering the location of the firearm injuries in the limbs, it is very likely that many blood vessels would have been grossly damaged, resulting in fatal haemorrhaging.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 722B was:

Multiple firearm injuries to limbs
