## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

## **SUMMARY:**

A complete body minus just a few bones of the left hand. The remains were partly skeletonized and disarticulated but with some dried skin still on the legs and rather greasy soft tissue elsewhere.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male, aged between 31 and 71, and measured from 176 to 191 cms in height. The only other potentially identifying feature was some dental work in his upper jaw, where there was a metal bridge with gold and silver teeth.

He died from a gunshot injury to the head, which had fragmented the skull, particularly the front half and the face, and left large pieces of bone missing. The entry hole appeared to be in the centre of the upper part of the forehead.

He had also been shot in the right upper arm, fragmenting the bone there, and probably also in the right thigh, where the upper end of the femur was shattered. Elsewhere, there were a number of fractured ribs on both sides of the chest and a fracture of one of the bones in the lower part of the neck. These may or may not have been related to the gunshot injury to the right arm or been separate injuries. It was not even clear whether they occurred before or after death. Fractures of the left side of the pelvis, however, were almost certainly post mortem in nature, from crushing or moving the body after death.

There were no other significant findings.

## **CAUSE OF DEATH:**

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 741B was:

Gunshot injury to head
