AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A complete and largely intact body, with much of the skin and soft tissues of the face, trunk and legs remaining, and only partial skeletonization of the arms.

The person was male as established from anthropology data, aged between 31 and 60, and measured from 162 to 178 cms in height. He had dark brown hair and, at the time of his death, a short dark beard. He would also have been distinctive in that his right elbow joint was permanently bent at 90°, due to fusion of two of the bones there. Whether this was congenital or the result of an old injury or disease, however, is difficult to say.

Despite the good preservation of the body, it was not possible to establish how he died. There were fractures of his face and lower jaw, of the ribs on both sides of the chest, of the middle of the spine and of the right shoulder blade, but these were probably all post mortem in nature, from crushing or moving the body after death. There were no obvious gunshot injuries and no bullet or bullet fragments seen radiologically.

Death from other causes, natural or otherwise, cannot be excluded, but from this examination, the cause of death in this person must remain unascertained

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 742B was:

Unascertained
