AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A complete and intact body, with the skin and soft tissues still present over most of it, and many of the internal organs surviving.

The person was male and appeared to be slightly obese. From anthropology data, he was aged between 31 and 71, and measured from 165 to 181 cms in height. There were no particular identifying features.

He died from gunshot wounds to the head and trunk, the former with the bullet probably entering the left side of the top of the skull, fracturing it, but not exiting, and the latter with the bullet entering the left side of the back of the chest, passing through the ribcage and lung, and fragmenting one of the vertebrae in the spine. There was a third shot to the back of his right upper arm. Bullets were recovered from inside the head and from the arm.

The only other injuries were a fracture of the lower jaw which may or my not have been part of the bullet wound to the head or caused separately, and multiple fractured ribs on both sides of the chest which were almost certainly post mortem in nature, from crushing or moving the body after death.

When found, there was a cloth blindfold around his head.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 882B was:

Gunshot wounds to head and chest

This formal report is based upon the autopsy report that I prepared at the time of my examination. Both reports truly and accurately reflect my findings
