## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

## SUMMARY:

A complete and intact body with dried leathery skin and soft tissues present over most of it, and several of the internal organs still surviving.

The person was male, and as established by anthropology data, was adult (aged over 31) and measured from 172 to 188 cms. Apart from having a stubbly beard at the time of his death, there were no particular identifying features.

He died from multiple gunshot wounds to the trunk and legs, with apparent bullet entrance holes on the left lower abdomen, in the middle of the lower part of the back, on the outer part of the left hip and in the middle of the left thigh. Internally there was damage respectively to the left side of the pelvis, the lumbar spine, and the head and shaft of the left femur. Bullets were recovered from each of these areas, the ones at the spine and the hip being embedded in the bone itself. There was an additional possible bullet fragment in the chest.

Other injuries included multiple fractured ribs on both sides of the chest and a fracture of the left upper arm below the shoulder. The former were probably post mortem in nature from crushing or moving the body after death. The arm fractures may have been similar or have been caused by blunt force trauma of some form.

There were no other significant findings.

## **CAUSE OF DEATH:**

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number KK3 906B was:

Gunshot wounds of trunk and legs
