AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A largely complete body minus the head, hands and feet, the remains being completely skeletonized and dry, with no soft tissue attached whatever.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male, aged between 17 and 65, and measured from 179 to 195 cms in height. The only additional identifying feature was a probable old fracture of his left fibula just above the ankle.

There was evidence of possible gunshot injuries to the pelvis and right thigh, as suggested by green staining of the bone at each site, presumably caused by the copper jackets of bullets which had been lying there in the soft tissues. This was only presumption however, and as there were no associated fractures and the bullets could well have penetrated the body after death, it would be impossible to prove the injuries as the cause of death.

The only other injuries were one or two rib fractures on either side of the chest and fractures of the lower ends of the right shin bones, but these potentially could have occurred after death from crushing or moving the body.

There were no other significant findings.
