SUMMARY:

The upper half of a body only, minus the pelvis and lower legs. The remains were completely skeletonized, with no soft tissues remaining apart from the brain inside the skull.

As established from anthropology data, the person was male and aged between 31 and 72. It was not possible to give any estimate of height, and there were no other particular identifying features.

He would appear to have died from a gunshot wound to the head, the shot entering at the back on the left side, and probably exiting through the right orbit. There was minimal associated fracturing of the skull, indicating that the shot was of low velocity. This could mean that it was a pistol that was used instead of a high velocity weapon, or that a shot from the latter passed through an intermediate target beforehand.

There were fractures of the right side of his face and lower jaw and of the right shoulder blade and several ribs, but these probably occurred post mortem due to crushing or moving the body.

When found, there was no clothing on the body.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **KK3 056B** was:
Gunshot wound of head
