AUTOPSY REPORT

SUMMARY:

A complete body minus just one of the thoracic vertebrae in the spine and a few small bones from the hands. The remains were largely skeletonized apart from a little pultaceous soft material still adherent. They were within clothing.

As determined from anthropology data the person was male, and aged between 30 and 60, but it was not possible to estimate his height. There were no particular identifying features.

He would appear to have died from a gunshot wound to the trunk, which had fragmented 5 vertebrae in the upper part of the spine. The shot is likely to have been to the back of the body and undoubtedly would have caused substantial internal damage. Some bullet fragments remained inside the body.

He had also been shot in the left side of the pelvis, probably from the right side. This also was a potentially fatal injury.

There were blunt force injuries to the ribs, shoulder blades and right femur, but they probably occurred post mortem from crushing of the body. There were no other significant findings.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **KK3 158B** was:

Gunshot wounds to trunk and pelvis
