AUTOPSY REPORT

KOZLUK GRAVE SITE

SUMMARY:

A complete body, partly skeletonized, but with a substantial amount of pultaceous soft material adherent to bones, and dried skin in some areas.

As established from anthropological data, the person was male, aged between 31 and 60, and measured from 166 to 181 cms. in height. Apart from a longstanding bony nodule on the front of his right leg above the knee, there were no particular identifying features.

He died from a gunshot wound to the head, a bullet or bullet fragment entering probably towards the back of the right side, low down, but not apparently exiting. Small bullet fragments were found internally. The entrance defect in the skull was irregular and unusual and the extent of the associated fracturing limited. This suggested that the bullet had passed through an intermediate target before striking him. A further fragment may have struck his lower jaw which was fractured on that side.

He had also been shot through his left upper arm, fracturing the bone beneath, and in the left leg where an intact bullet was recovered from the tissues around the knee. There was no fracturing associated with the latter however, and it may be that, like the head, the bullet had passed through something or someone else before striking him. A few other bullet fragments were found in soft tissues elsewhere.

When found, there was a cloth ligature around one wrist: it appeared to have broken off the other.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **KK3 311B** was:

Gunshot injury to head
