## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

### **SUMMARY:**

A largely intact skull including the lower jaw together with the uppermost bone of the spine. The remains were completely skeletonized.

From anthropology examination, the skull was from an adult male, someone over the age of 19, but it was not possible to determine anything further.

There were fractures of the face and of the lower jaw but these probably occurred after death from crushing or moving of the body.

There were no other injuries and from this examination, it is not possible to determine the cause of death in this person.
