## **AUTOPSY REPORT**

GLOGOVA GRAVE SITE

### **SUMMARY:**

An assortment of bones and small body parts, all completely skeletonized.

As established from anthropology examination they were from at least two individuals, both of them adults over 17, but it was not possible to say whether male or female. One of them however, had clearly fractured his or her left collarbone in the past.

Both skulls present were fragmented, with only small portions remaining. Although it was not possible to completely prove what caused the damage, one of the fracture edges did show what could have been a bullet hole.

There were no other findings and despite the above suspicions with one of the skulls, from this examination it is not possible to determine the cause of death in either of these persons.

### **CAUSE OF DEATH:**

It is my determination that the cause of death in case number **GL05 058(ii) BP** was:  
**Unascertained**
